

PACKING LIST -- Boys

You may bring one carry on bag that must fit under a seat or in an overhead compartment, not to exceed 22x14x9). The charge is \$25 for one checked bag not to exceed 50 lbs. or combined length, width and height of 62. *Due to Homeland Security, all liquids and creams that you carry on need to be put in one quart-sized zip lock bag. Bottles larger than 3 ounces are not permitted with carry on. This includes contact solution.* **When packing, think light, loose, and cool!**

Things to pack. Note some items are marked *optional

- sun hat**
- sunglasses
- sturdy walking shoes
- other pair of comfortable shoes/sandals
- 5 pairs of socks
- 5 underwear
- sleep wear
- 2-3 pairs of long pants (lightweight pants are suggested)
- 4 shirts (cotton t-shirts are not the best idea -- they do not dry quickly)
- at least 1 long sleeve shirt (good for layering/sun protection)
- Rain jacket
- day pack
- water bottle
- sunscreen/lip balm** (3 oz size)
- toothbrush, paste and floss (3 oz)
- travel size deodorant (3 oz)
- travel size shampoo/conditioner (3 oz)
- soap in sealable container
- hand sanitizer (like Purell) (3 oz)
- moist disposable towelettes
- comb/brush
- journal (ziploc bag)
- ink pen
- pencil w/sharpener
- Spanish/English dictionary
- flashlight/headlamp
- independent reading
- cash
- money belt or passport bag
- snacks
- electrolytes, like Emergen-C or electrolyte chews
- alarm clock or watch
- facial tissue and/or toilet paper
- prescriptions (to be carried in the original bottle)
- bandanna
- camera with extra batteries
- iPod (see RULES list)
- Band-Aids
- face cloth
- insect repellent
- anti-itch cream
- a couple extra zip loc bags
- razor
- Pepto Bismal, Immodium

Please don't bring:
computers or tablets
